TO THOSE WHO HAVE GONE BEFORE...AND MORE

One of the tasks falling to any author/editor pulling together a community history is an assessment of what's already been written. Typically such earlier treatments are invaluable sources of information and perspective, and chronicle how local history was viewed at another time. The historian stands to benefit greatly from familiarizing him/herself with these sources before beginning a new endeavor.

As small as Grantham is, several informative histories of the town survive. The earliest known treatment was written by Claremont's Edwin A. Charlton, who included a short historical profile of the town in his 1856 *Gazetter*. Significantly more informative was the 1886 contribution to *The Histories of Cheshire and Sullivan Counties, New Hampshire*, written by Grantham's own Lorenzo Dunbar. Dunbar chronicles the names of many early settlers and details the activities in which they were involved, whether civic, commercial, religious, etc. In 1927, the Rev. Ned Witham, pastor of the Grantham Methodist Church, presented an address on the history of the town that was published as part of the Sullivan County Centennial Celebration. Naturally, it focused more on the history of the church, but Rev. Witham himself was an important historical figure in Grantham, so his writings take on added import. More recently, in 1994 the late Walter Backofen of Plainfield wrote an examination of the historical connection between the towns of Grantham and Plainfield that chronicled how closely the two communities are intertwined. Finally, Plymouth State University student Delia Anderson wrote a history of the town (undated, but probably around 2002) that focused on the major economic, population and civic forces that shaped the town over its history.

Equally valuable – if not more so – are the twentieth-century histories written by Grantham residents. Premier among these are the series of articles written by the late Ella Roney. Ella, a founding member of the Grantham

Historical Society, began her interest in local history in 1940 with an essay originally written for a presentation to a Neighborhood Library Meeting on June 25 of that year. She continued to write articles about the town thereafter, in addition to her work as the town's correspondent to *The Argus-Champion*. Grantham native and long-time resident Dennis Howard contributed several essays on various aspects of Grantham history, all of which are rich with detail. In 1967 – and again in 1976 – his sister Amah Howard oversaw the preparation of the first formal town history, first as part of the town's bicentennial and again as part of the national bicentennial. Filled with photographs and a thematic approach to the important trends in town history, it has proved invaluable as a starting point for future work. Since its founding in 1993, members of the historical society have attempted to continue this tradition with various publications, most recently for the 2005 trolley tour and the 2007 walking tour of Grantham village.

As the work has begun on the current history, we attempt to carry on this considerable legacy. Bob Champagne, long-time member, former officer and devoted participant in many of our activities, has contributed mightily to this effort. He has written over thirty essays on a number of themes, including such varied topics as post offices, town boundaries and the Grantham "aerodrome" on Route 114. His work will serve as the foundation upon which we will build. Other authors like Laura Jean Whitcomb have also written important sections of the book, and we couldn't be more grateful for her talent and commitment. However, as we move forward, much remains to be written. We look forward to making significant progress over the fall and winter with our current team of writers and researchers, but strongly encourage anyone interested in writing to contact me directly. We welcome your enthusiasm and interest, and will graciously find plenty for you to do!

A BRIEF BACKWARD GLANCE: GRANTHAM HISTORICAL SOCIETY ACCOMPLISHMENTS SINCE JANUARY 2009

The GHS Executive Committee began holding monthly meetings in June 2006 as the move of the town offices from the Village School #7 to the new Municipal Building was completed. The thrice-yearly GHS meetings were not considered to be frequent enough to manage the details that arose as the Town Archives and Historical Society expanded into the old building. At about the same time, a very large legacy was received (unexpectedly) by GHS from Jeremy Brown which required even more attention from the Society as decisions about the use of the money and investments had to be made Keeping GHS members aware of what the Executive Committee does is accomplished by availability of meeting minutes, reports at regular Historical Society meetings held three times a year and via the quarterly newsletter. An annual report of activities is handed out at every annual meeting in May.

In order to help the Executive Committee and membership have an overview of our activities since January, 2009, the minutes of every meeting have been reviewed. Below is a summary of the work that has been completed and activities that are in progress or on-going.

November 25, 1920

“This is Thanksgiving Day and a pretty good day only not very good traveling.... little Henry and I went up in our woods rabbit hunting a little while but didn’t get nothing. Nina, Mildred, Henry and I eat our dinner alone. We had the baked chicken, white and sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, cheese. Mince pie and cracker pudding. Could have had pumpkin and apple pies but we didn’t care for them. We had onions, squash and turnips. We wish everyone had had as good a dinner....”

GRAVESTONE OF OLIVE O.

In a previous newsletter, we asked for information about a small gravestone found in the old Grantham police storage area last year. Thanks to the Croydon Historical Society for their response. With some embarrassment, we announce that Olive O. Dow was very likely born in Grantham c. 1837 and died here in 1840. Genealogical research revealed that her father, Lorenzo Dow, was born in Lyman, NH in 1811 and her mother, Sarah (last name unknown) was probably born in 1815. Sarah died of "childbed fever" in Croydon in 1858 at age 43. Olive O. was very likely their firstborn, followed by Sarah Celina (b. 1838), Lorenzo Dexter (b. 1840), Silva C (b.1845) and Olive F (b. 1847). The family is recorded in the 1840 and 1850 Grantham censuses. Lorenzo paid road taxes in Grantham in 1845. He remarried shortly after Sarah's death and had several more children, in addition to being stepfather to his second wife's three children. They were all living in Springfield, NH by the 1870 census and had moved to Penacook some time before Lorenzo's death in 1889. We are now trying to identify which Grantham cemetery might be the site of her burial. No death certificate was found in New Hampshire Vital Statistics.

NEWS FROM THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Historical Society accepts with regret the resignation of Vice-President Bob Champagne for health reasons. Bob is one of the original members of GHS and has been a steadfast and committed Board member from the very beginning. He has also completed over thirty chapters for our History of Grantham. We all wish him well.

GHS President Ken Story has just been appointed interim selectmen until the next election. We are very pleased that the skills he has brought to the Historical Society will now be apparent to the town. Congratulations, Ken!

The business photo project being done by Rae Tober and Pat Andrews has been completed. We now have visible documentation of the Grantham business community at one specific point in time in the 21st century.

The Croydon Society held an open house and regional meeting of historical societies on Wednesday, August 24 at their house museum on Route 10 South in Croydon Village (large yellow Colonial on the right). Most of the members of our Executive Committee attended. Their museum is filled with Croydon artifacts and the architectural details of their 18th century house are intact. They are open on Sundays.

Laura Jean Whitcomb continues as our expert manager of the GHS website (www.granthamhistoricalsociety.org). She has provided information about the "hits" we have gotten between June and August 2011, based on weekly data. There has been an average of 60 visitors per month, 91% of whom are new. The length of visits lasts 11 minutes. During the last week of August, 23 people visited our website. Half entered via our website address and the

other half by using a search engine. Of the 23 visitors, 12 came from the US, 5 from Russia, 3 from Canada, 2 from the UK, and 1 each from Australia and Tanzania. The three month totals: 182 visitors of whom 166 were new; number of pages viewed: 463.

In July, two successful events were sponsored by GHS. A farewell ice cream social was held on July 9, 2011 on behalf of the town to thank Lea Frey for her years of work dedicated to the Town Archives. The following weekend, a picture party was held, an opportunity for Grantham residents to bring in old photos that could be scanned and returned immediately. Please see page 3 for a winner!

FALL GHS MEETING

The regular fall meeting of the Historical Society will be held on October 20, 2011 at the Town Hall (lower level) at 7:00 PM. Theodore Roosevelt will be making a special visit to Grantham to talk about his Presidency as well as the many interests he promoted during his political life and as a private citizen. Landmarks during his Presidency include building the Panama Canal, establishing national parks and creating legislation which protected consumers. His personal interests were broad – naturalist, rancher, soldier, writer, big game hunter. He was a visitor to Corbin Park, then a private hunting preserve, in 1902 where he shot a boar that was later stuffed and mounted for his office. Perhaps the boar was in the Grantham section of Corbin Park? Please come on October 20 to show support for one of our outstanding Presidents.

NEW ITEMS IN OUR COLLECTIONS

Over the summer, eight new items have been added to our Collections. These include three record books from Bouldervale Farm from Connie Howard, an oil can and cane from the Dunbar House, square-cut nails from the Currier House on Howe Bill Road which is being dismantled and a matchbox from Tallulah's, Eastman. A major donation is the 1755 Jeffrey's map of New England, given to us by the Dunbar Free Library. More in the next newsletter about this gift.
